

Teng purge only 1 part

HONG KONG (UPI) — The recent purge of ex-Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-ping is part of a "life-and-death" struggle with bourgeois forces that Chinese Communists will inevitably win, the party newspaper Peoples Daily said Saturday.

The article, carried by the official New China News Agency, analyzed Teng's "stubbornness" in pursuing the "capitalist road" after being given a chance to mend his ways following an earlier purge during China's Cultural Revolution.

Teng, ousted from the government for a second time April 7, persisted in pushing economic development over Communist principles because he "is the general representative of the bourgeoisie inside and outside the party," Peoples Daily said.

"In a Socialist society members of the bourgeoisie still exist and are unreconciled to their defeat," the article said. "The bourgeoisie exists not only in society at large but also in the party

presumed drowned in a helicopter crash.

At the same time, divers for the private flight service which owned the helicopter searched the floor of the gulf for the fuselage of the craft or bodies of the remaining victims.

"We have found nothing more since the four bodies that were picked up yesterday," a Coast Guard spokesman said.

Another said the search ended "pending further developments" about 2 p.m. because the only signs of the crash were small debris floating on the water, "but nothing that we haven't already seen."

The bodies of four offshore oil rig workers were recovered among the wreckage of the Petroleum Helicopters, Inc., Bell Ranger 15 which crashed Friday three miles from the platform

Guard spokesman Ken Palmer. "Good visibility, cloud cover was fairly high, no high winds, everything was favorable for search efforts."

"And we didn't find anything."

The missing men included pilot Walter Barger, 47, of Nederland, Tex.

Petroleum Helicopter vice president Frank Lee said the divers went into the water at

Cameron on a routine ferrying flight to the Blue Dolphin platform, about 45 miles out in the gulf. It was last heard from about 8 a.m. Friday when dispatchers picked up an unusual radio transmission.

As the search continued, a Coast Guard board of inquiry took testimony for the fourth straight day in an investigation of the sinking of an offshore rig April 15 with a loss of 13 lives.

Doctor, civic leader Walter Dolfini dies

Dr. Walter W. Dolfini, M.D., a native of Eureka, active civic leader and prominent Eureka doctor, has died at the age of 67.

Up to his death, Dolfini was president of the Eureka Rotary Club, where he had been a member for almost 35 years. He was also a long-time member of the Eureka Chamber of Commerce, where he served as both president and education committee chairman.

In addition to being chief of staff at General Hospital,

Dolfini served 37 years at the hospital.

A graduate of Eureka High School, he attended Humboldt State University, studied at Stanford University and completed his medical degree at McGill University in Montreal, Canada.

He was one of the founding fathers of the College of the Redwoods, after extensively studying junior college school systems and serving on local community education projects, including the Chamber of Commerce education committee for many years.

He personally visited 11 northern California junior colleges to become acquainted with the system, and made a concerted effort to educate local citizen committees about the educational structure before the founding of the local junior college.

Dolfini was later named chairman of the Humboldt State University Advisory Board.

He also served as chairman of the Humboldt Arts Council, Eureka Heritage Commission, and the Redwood Region Conservation Council, and was president of the Humboldt County Medical Society and president of the Ingomar Club.

Reagan wins - Arizona vote

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) — Ronald Reagan's forces made it a near sweep in the Arizona State Republican Convention Saturday, obtaining 27 of the state's 29 delegate votes.

The voting was broken down between congressional district and at-large selections.

In the four congressional districts, Reagan captured 11 of the 12 delegates. In the at-large selection process, he won 16 of 17. The other two votes went to President Ford.

The voting selection process culminated a day-long convention of nearly 700 Republican precinct committeemen and members of the state Republican Committee.

Each congressional district selected three delegates to the convention in party caucuses, where Reagan won 11 of the 12 possible votes
